If you want to be miserable, then go on being miserable, but don't make the rest of us miserable". Father taught us there are so many ways to fast. So many! And you don't have to be miserable. 

Father taught us, "there are two parts to fasting: You fast from something and feast on something else. You are separated from the world and dedicated to God. The understanding is drawn from Scripture. God is inviting you to a feast, but you must fast. Breakfast means to break the fast, not to eat like it is your last meal." Father gave us a number of fasting options below. Men, challenge yourself this Lent and see how much you grow spiritually. The Lord will see you make the effort and He will help you. Your Lenten effort will bear much fruit long after the season of Easter is over. And you will have a worthwhile, holy Lent.

CARRY YOUR FAMILY IN YOUR HEART - A CALL TO HOLINESS

A husband/father's guide to his vocation and spiritual direction. Each Newsletter focuses on one of the Guidelines or Areas of Growth from the "Carry Your Family In Your Heart" book. These guidelines to our Fatherhood Vocation & Spiritual Formation have been formatted based on the Fatherhood Retreat Guideline Teachings & under Spiritual Direction of Fr. Santan Pinto, S.O.L.T.

COMPANION/GUARDIAN

Our goal as a father is that our family goes to heaven. As companion to our spouse, we are her friend and her helper. We have a responsibility to share and communicate. What kind of conversationalist am I? Do I babble on incessantly, never leaving a second of silence? Do I pause to hear what my spouse has to say?

Do I listen not only from my perspective, but hers as well. "It is not good that man should be alone." As companions we need to take time together. Although your conversations have been caring, have you really been together? Take time just to spend together, just appreciating each other or catching up on each other's lives. Remember why you chose your wife. Why she is special. What are the things that drew you to her in the first place. Work at this!

As her companion we also have the responsibility to pray - that is our communication with God. Too often we tend to once again do all the talking, instead of listening to God. How much more fruitful would it be if I took time to listen to God, who knows me even better than I know myself.

As guardians we need to follow the example of St. Joseph - protector of the Holy Family. God our Father entrusts each of us with our children. In reality, these are His children, not ours. We are simply stewards of all the gifts that God has given us.

Our children look to us for guidance and help as their guardian. And what strengthens us in this role, as a guardian is our desire to be holy. We need to strive to be holy.

Be sure not to "preach" to your children but lead by example. Let us always remember that we are needy and that our children are needy, not self-sufficient. We all need God. We all need others. We need to maintain a healthy perspective and gain the trust of our children.

As fathers we must always be ready to lend a hand, encourage, comfort and love our children. But at the same time we need to discipline firmly out of loving authority. Be firm, fair and balanced. Let your yes mean yes and your no mean no. Be ready to step in when you need to. But in order for your children to accept your authority, we have got to spend time with them. The only way to gain their trust is to spend time and talk to them. Once the trust is there, they come to you for guidance and they know that you are there for them.

Make them contributors. Let them contribute to the family, chores, responsibilities, for many of us know that children grow up far happier and balanced this way than if they have been handed everything they need or want their entire young life.

Fathers, never give up hope for your children that have fallen away. Always remain hopeful and pray for them. Nothing is impossible for God.

Prayer for a Child's Return to Faith

Dear Lord, You became human, suffered and died to win salvation for all. Look graciously on my child, who has drifted away from the faith -- and from You as well. Grant him(her) your grace to see the error of his (her) ways and return to the fold in Your care. Teach me to stay close to him(her) during this trying time, and strive to influence him(her) by action and prayers more than by words that may antagonize. Amen.

Scripture Readings

Scripture Reading Matt 2:13-15

The angel of the Lord appeared and spoke to Joseph. Joseph listened and took Mary and Jesus and fled and stayed in Egypt until the angel told him. We must open our hearts to God's word. Joseph is our example.

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Companion/Guardian Scripture Readings

Let the Lord speak to our hearts and act on His guidance. We must be silent; listen to God's word, trust and learn.

Scripture Reading Luke 24:13-35

On the Road to Emmaus, the two men recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread. Their hearts burned within them as He spoke to them of the <u>S</u>criptures. Their hearts were open to accept Jesus word and teaching. We must be ready to let Jesus teach us. And just as the men from Emmaus shared what Jesus taught them; we need to teach others what we learn.

Scripture Reading Luke 22:39-46

Jesus has showed us that our guardian angels from heaven are there with us to strengthen us. Ask for their help and guidance. Ask them to pray for you that when temptation comes you may remain strong to the test.

Scripture Reading 1Cor 12:31-13:8

We cannot truly be a guardian or companion if we do not love. Is our love patient and kind with our spouse and children? Is there jealousy in our love? Do we spend time with our children and seek their interests. All our actions are watched by our children. With our spouses do we always bring up old issues or hurts and continue to brood over it? As a guardian and companion we must love. We must bear, hope, and endure as we carry our families in our hearts.

Scripture Reading Genesis 2:18-24

The man clings to his wife and the two become one body, sharing totally, respecting totally, loving totally. Two are now one. We have a responsibility to share and communicate with our spouse. You are her companion. You need to spend time together. In order to grow together, you must spend time together.
