P- PRAYER

Praying with confidence, persistence and perseverance.

E - EXPECTATION

Hoping with expectation of the fulfillment of God's promises.

God our Father is true and fulfills all of His promises.

The spiritual virtue of hope is not like the world views hope as a kind of "wishing". The gift of hope is confidence that what the Lord promises is true. It is confident assurance of the peace Jesus gives that the world cannot give.

Here are a few of the promises of Christ shared by Fr. Santan Pinto.

Some Promises of Christ:

If you find yourself pushing the panic button, here's your answer: Have faith in God, and refuse to fear!

Fear gives the devil place, brings torment and keeps us from receiving all God has for us. Plus, it's a bad witness to a hurting world. So, why would you let fear come to Christmas dinner? To pull the plug on fear, try reading Matthew 11:28 three to five times every hour of every day instead of reading the news or your social media feeds. Place your Bible next to your bed, and if you wake up in the night with any kind of fearful thoughts, read the promises of God, then roll over and go back to sleep. When you're filled to the brim with the Word, you won't have any room to fear!

4. Live Life More Abundantly This Christmas "I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly." –John 10:10, NKJV

Christmas isn't just about the birth of Christ—it's about His purpose and His mission. He came to set the captives free and to give us life more abundantly. So, stop accepting sin, sickness and failure, and step into resurrection life! Once you understand you have the life of God inside you, you'll begin to act like Jesus did. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." –John 3:16, NKJV



Solemnity Of The Immaculate Conception December 8th...

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the solemn dogma defined by Blessed Pope Pius IX in 1854. As Our Lady Immaculately Conceived is the patroness of the United States of America, this is a holy day of obligation in the United States. Four years later, 1858, in Lourdes, France Our Lady confirmed to Bernadette that she is "The Immaculate Conception".

Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Blessed Pope Pius IX proclaimed on December 8, 1854: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Saviour of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin." — *Catechism of the Catholic Church*



DEVOTED TO OUR BLESSED MOTHER MARY

In our growth and development as fathers, we need a lot of help. Mary is our help. Without her protection and guidance, we will be lost. Mary is the surest, safest and simplest way to her Son. At the foot of the cross, our Lord, in giving Mary to beloved St. John, Jesus gave us His mother as well. We cannot go wrong under her guidance and protection.

Our Lady said "Yes." She said yes for all of us, for the entire human race. As fathers, we need to echo that yes for our own lives. In saying yes, we are saying that we will surrender what we are, our humanity, our fatherhood to the Holy Spirit and allow Christ to shape us, fill us, teach us. This surrender requires absolute trust just like Our Lady's surrender. It was without condition and without reservation.

Mary has given us two great gifts and both are great weapons against Satan - the Rosary and the Brown Scapular - a powerful devotion and sacramental endorsed by our Church. While holding the rosary in our hand, it is the same as holding our Blessed Mother's hand. Our Lady says to wear the scapular devoutly and perseveringly. "It is my garment. To be clothed in it means you are continually thinking of me, and I in turn, am always thinking of you and helping you secure eternal life."

Mary's devotion is to lead us to her Son. She leads us to her Son in the Eucharist. Every second of the day, somewhere in the world a priest is lifting the host. In the same way that the Word of God nourishes, so does the Eucharist. In the Eucharist we witness heaven and earth come together.

As fathers we should offer our families protection and guidance to Mary. As St. John Damascene says, "To be devoted to Mary is an arm of salvation which God gives to those whom He wishes to save."

1st CANDLE – (purple) THE PROPHECY CANDLE or CANDLE OF HOPE – We can have hope because God is faithful and will keep the promises made to us. Our hope comes from God. (Romans 15:12-13)

2nd CANDLE – (purple) THE BETHLEHEM CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF PREPARATION – God kept his promise of a Savior who would be born in Bethlehem. Preparation means to "get ready". Help us to be ready to welcome YOU, O GOD! (Luke 3:4-6)

3rd CANDLE – (pink) THE SHEPHERD CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF JOY – The angels sang a message of JOY! (Luke 2:7-15)

4th CANDLE – (purple) THE ANGEL CANDLE or THE CANDLE
OF LOVE – The angels announced the good news of a
Savior. God sent his only Son to earth to save us, because
he loves us! (John 3:16-17)

5th CANDLE – (white) "CHRIST CANDLE" – The white candle reminds us that Jesus is the spotless lamb of God, sent to wash away our sins! His birth was for his death, his death was for our birth! (John 1:29)



Saints Corner - Pope Declares A Year of St. Joseph

ROME –Pope Francis on Tuesday (Dec 8,2020) issued a decree launching a special year dedicated to St. Joseph coinciding the anniversary of his declaration as Patron of the Catholic Church, hailing him as a model of fatherhood and a key intercessor in modern times.

Published Dec. 8, on the 150th anniversary of *Quemadmodum Deus* by Pope Pius IX which declared St. Joseph patron of the Catholic Church, the decree formally instituted a year for St. Joseph, which will run until Dec. 8, 2021.

The document, signed by the head of the Vatican's Apostolic Penitentiary, Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, said the year would be an opportunity for faithful to follow St. Joseph's example and "daily strengthen their life of faith in full fulfillment of God's will."

"All faithful will thus have the opportunity to commit themselves, with the help of St. Joseph, head of the heavenly Family of Nazareth, comfort and relief from the serious human and social tribulations which today afflict the contemporary world," it said.

The decree outlined several instances in which faithful will be able to obtain a plenary indulgence in relation to the Year of St. Joseph, provided they meet the usual conditions of going to confession, receiving the Eucharist, and praying for the intentions of the pope.

- According to the document, a plenary indulgence will be available under these conditions: To those who meditate of the Our Father prayer for at least 30 minutes or take part in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph
- To those who perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy
- To families or engaged couples who recite the rosary together
- To those who entrust their daily work to St. Joseph and those who ask St. Joseph to intercede for the unemployed
- To those who recite a prayer to St. Joseph (the litanies of St. Joseph in Latin rite, or Akathistos to St. Joseph in the Byzantine rite, or any other prayer to St. Joseph) for the relief of Christians persecuted both inside and outside of the Church
- To faithful who recite "any legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of St. Joseph," with an encouragement to do so on the March 19 and May 1 feasts of St. Joseph, the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, the Byzantine celebration of St. Joseph's Sunday, and on the 19th of every month and on every Wednesday, which has been dedicated to St. Joseph in the Latin rite



 To the elderly, sick, dying and those legitimately unable to leave the house, who recite an act of piety to St. Joseph under his title of Comfort of the Sick and Patron of a happy death, provided they offer their discomfort to God and fulfill the conditions for the indulgence "as soon as possible"

Piacenza urged all priests with the appropriate faculties to make themselves available to an extra degree to offer confessions and to administer communion to the sick more often. In an apostolic letter issued Dec. 8 to coincide with the launch of the Year of St. Joseph, Pope Francis recalled Joseph's actions in the bible, noting that after the Virgin Mary, no other saint has been mentioned as frequently by popes.
