Pope Francis: Lent 2022 Message

In preparation for Lent 2022, Pope Francis has <u>released his annual message</u>, reflecting on St Paul's epistle to the Galatians: 'Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up' (6:9-10).

Sowing for eternal life

'Lent invites us to conversion,' Francis wrote, 'to a change in mindset, so that life's truth and beauty may be found not so much in possessing as in giving, not so much in accumulating as in sharing and sowing goodness.'

The kind of conversion that Lent calls us to is what we are summoned to every day. Lent 'is in some way an image' of life itself. Part of this conversion is the willingness to sow goodness in the life of others; even when we do not see the fruits of what we sow, no act of love, no matter how small, Pope Francis says, will be lost in the eyes of God.



The Word of God 'broadens and elevates our vision' so that we are not so concerned with witnessing visible fruits in this life. Instead, 'the real harvest is eschatological, the harvest of the last, undying day.'

Those who are intimately united to him in love "by dying a death like his" (Romans 6:5) will be united to his resurrection for eternal life ...'

The call of conversion is the call to sow for the fruit of eternal life.

'Let us not grow tired of doing good'

A key appeal that appears throughout the Scriptures, however, is to not grow tired:

The Lenten season calls us to place our faith and hope in the Lord, since only if we fix our gaze on the risen Christ will we be able to respond to the Apostle's appeal, "Let us never grow tired of doing good."

The endurance we are called to is not a matter of human effort alone; it is the result of God's grace, a grace that strengthens the weak and gives youthfulness to the old. Faith does not release us from the storms of life, but instead allows us to face them in union with Jesus:

... only the paschal mystery of Jesus Christ triumphs over the dark waters of death.'

Pope Francis points to several things we should not grow tired of: prayer, uprooting evil from our lives, asking for forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance, fighting concupiscence, and doing good in active charity towards our neighbours.

There was one addiction Pope Francis pointed to for us to be aware of: 'digital media'. The Pope encouraged us to use the Lenten season to cultivate more integral forms of human communication, made up of 'authentic encounters' with real people. Digital media, he says, 'impoverishes human relationships.'

'If we do not give up, we shall reap the harvest'

'Let us ask God to give us the patient perseverance of the farmer,' Pope Francis said, 'and to persevere in doing good, one step at a time.' In this season of conversion, the soil of our hearts 'is prepared by fasting, watered by prayer and enriched by charity,' he said. And though we stumble and fall, 'let us not hesitate to return to God who is "generous and forgiving" (Isaiah 55:7)'.

May the Virgin Mary, who bore the Saviour in her womb and "pondered all these things in her heart" (Luke 2:19), obtain for us the gift of patience. May she accompany us with her maternal presence, so that this season of conversion may bring forth fruits of eternal salvation.'

God our Father, we give you thanks and praise for fathers young and old. We pray for young fathers, embracing their vocation; may they find courage and perseverance to balance work, family and faith in joy and sacrifice. We pray for fathers around the world whose children are lost or suffering; may they know that the God of compassion walks with them in their sorrow. We pray for men who are not fathers but still mentor and guide us with fatherly love and advice. We remember fathers, grandfather, and great grandfathers who are no longer with us but who live forever in our memory and nourish us with their love. Amen

LENTEN Q & A

Q: What are my Fasting and Abstinence Obligations during Lent?

A: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of universal fast and abstinence. Fasting is obligatory for all who have completed their 18th year and have not yet reached their 60th year. Fasting allows a person to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may be taken, not to equal one full meal. Abstinence (from meat) is obligatory for all who have reached their 14th year.

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection.

Abstinence:

Fridays in Lent are obligatory days of complete abstinence (from meat) for all who have completed their 14th year.

Q:Why do we say that there are forty days of Lent? When you count all the days from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, there are 46.

A: It might be more accurate to say that there is the "forty day fast within Lent." Historically, Lent has varied from a week to three weeks to the present configuration of 46 days. The forty day fast, however, has been more stable. The Sundays of Lent are certainly part of the Time of Lent, but they are not prescribed days of fast and abstinence.

Q: What determines the date Easter Sunday falls on or when Lent begins. Why is it different every year?

A: The Council of Nicaea, in 325 A.D., determined that Easter should be celebrated the first Sunday after the first full moon of spring. To determine the beginning of Lent, count back six Sundays before Easter. The Wednesday before the first of these Sundays is Ash Wednesday.

Q: What 3 things should you do more of during lent?

A: 3 things you should more of and not less during lent are alms giving, fasting and prayer

But visit Your mercies and compassions upon Your humble servants, those who fight in defense of Ukraine and her much-suffering people, outnumbered though they be, and hear us who fall down before Your deep compassion. With Your mercy enlighten and make glad the hearts of the civil authorities, and strengthened them by Your might.

To Forgive Is To Receive

Brothers, the pastor of our parish recently gave a homily on forgiveness. It was very powerful and seemed very appropriate to share with you all during the season of lent. It's a great testimony to the mercy of God and a gift of grace to us in following Christ's command to forgive and receive forgiveness.

..."If you forgive men their transgressions, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you do not forgive men, neither will your Father forgive you your transgressions." Matt. 6:7-15

This last passage of today's gospel presents us with an ideal we must strive for. It also presents us with the consequences if we do not strive for this ideal. Forgive and be forgiven. Both must be desired and sought after.


When forgiveness is properly understood, it is much easier to desire, give and receive. When it is not properly understood, forgiveness can be seen as a confusing and heavy burden and, therefore, as something undesirable.

Perhaps the greatest challenge to the act of forgiving another is the sense of "justice" that can appear to be lost when forgiveness is given. This is especially true when forgiveness is offered to someone who fails to ask forgiveness. On the contrary, when one does ask for forgiveness, and expresses true remorse, it is much easier to forgive and to abandon the feeling that the offender should "pay" for what was done. But when there is a lack of sorrow on the part of the offender, this leaves what can feel like a lack of justice if forgiveness is offered. This can be a difficult feeling to overcome by ourselves.

It's important to note that forgiving another does not excuse their sin. Forgiveness does not mean that the sin did not happen or that it is OK that it happened. Rather, forgiving another does the opposite. Forgiving actually points to the sin, acknowledges it and makes it a central focus. This is important to understand. By identifying the sin that is to be forgiven, and then forgiving it, justice is done in a supernatural way. Justice is fulfilled by mercy. And the mercy offered has an even greater effect on the one offering mercy than the one it is offered to.

By offering mercy for the sin of another, we become freed of the effects of their sin. Mercy is a way for God to remove this hurt from our lives and free us to encounter His mercy all the more by the forgiveness of our own sins for which we could never deserve on our own effort.

Let us reflect today upon the person you most need to forgive. Who is it and what have they done that has offended you? Do not be afraid to offer the mercy of forgiveness and do not hesitate in doing so. The mercy you offer will bring forth the justice of God in a way that you could never accomplish by your own efforts. This act of forgiving also frees you from the burden of that sin, and enables God to forgive you of your sins.

Divine Mercy—Novena Begins Good Friday April 15th

On September 13, 1935, Sister Faustina had a terrible vision of a destroying Angel ("the agent of divine wrath") about to strike some place on the planet. She began praying, begging him to put off the punishment until the world did penance. At first, her pleas seemed in vain, but presently she saw the Holy Trinity and felt the power of Christ's grace in her soul. Again she began to plead for the world in words that welled up out of the silence of her soul: "Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, for our sins and those of the whole world; for the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us" (475).

Her prayer was answered and the angel was prevented from carrying out the chastisement. The following morning, Sister Faustina heard these interior words: "Every time you enter the chapel, start reciting the prayer which I taught you yesterday" (476).

Later, she was instructed in the recitation of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy: "This prayer will serve to appease My wrath. You will recite it for nine days, on the beads of the Rosary, in the following manner: first of all, you will say one Our Father and Hail Mary and the I Believe in God. Then, on the Our Father beads, you will say the following words: 'Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly

beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, for our sins and those of the whole world.' On the Hail Mary beads you will say the following words: 'For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.' In conclusion, three times you will recite these words: 'Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world' " (476).

Jesus Himself tells us why it is so important to recite this prayer: "Recite the chaplet unceasingly that I have taught you. Whoever recites it will receive great mercy at the hour of death. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even in the case of the most hardened sinner, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy. I desire that the whole world know My infinite mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls that trust in My mercy" (687).

"Oh, what great graces I will grant to souls that say this chaplet; the very depths of My tender mercy are stirred for the sake of those who say the chaplet" (848). "At the hour of their death, I defend as My own glory every soul that will say this chaplet; or when others say it for a dying person, the indulgence is the same" (811). "Through the chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask is compatible with My will" (1731).
