Steps In Littleness Step #5: Immerse Yourself In The Eucharist

Recognize the deep hunger and thirst that you possess for the things of God.

- This hunger seeks fulfillment in the transitory things of this world.
- One gets used to feeding oneself with food that quickly satisfies.
- In the Eucharist the soul finds everlasting food that satisfies the deepest longing of the soul.
- Place your desires, fears, struggles, temptations, habits, addictions, thoughts, emotions, hurts, memories, etc., in the heart of Jesus lifted in the Eucharist every moment of the day.
- Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament calls you to find your home in Him.
- If you are tired rest in His presence, He loves little ones asleep in His arms.
- Expect to be tempted grossly if you spend time with the Lord in the Eucharist.
- Spend your life preparing to receive Him and continually thanking Him for this gift. (continued on page 2)

Police Dogs Recognized Jesus In The Tabernacle.

The dog in the photo was trained to identify life after earthquakes. His posture and the fact of staying fixed

as seen in the image is the posture that tells the rescuer that there is life in that place. And look at nothing more and nothing less where and in front of who is placed: in front of Jesus as the Eucharistic bread in the tabernacle, the living God among us.

On the evening of the last day of Pope John Paul II's October 1995 visit to the United States of America, he was scheduled to greet the Seminarians at Saint Mary's Seminary in Baltimore.

It had been a very full day that began with the Holy Mass at Oriole Park in Camden Yards, a parade through downtown streets, a visit to the Basilica of the Assumption-the first cathedral in the country, lunch at a local soup kitchen run by Catholic Charities; a prayer service



at the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in North Baltimore; and finally a quick stop at Saint Mary's Seminary.

The schedule was so tight that the plan was simply to greet the seminarians while they stood outside on the staircases. But the Pope made his way through their ranks and into the building. He had another plan, to greet Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament first.

When his wishes were made known, Security personnel flung into action. They swept the building paying close attention to the chapel where the Pope would be praying. For this purpose highly trained dogs were used to detect any person who might be present.

These dogs are trained to locate survivors in collapsed buildings after earthquakes and other disasters. These highly intelligent and eager dogs quickly went through the halls, offices and classrooms and were then sent to the chapel. They went up and down the aisle, past the pews and finally into the side chapel where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved. Upon reaching the tabernacle, the dogs sniffed, whined, pointed, and refused to leave, their attention riveted on the tabernacle, until they were called by their handlers. They were convinced that they discovered someone there. We Catholics know they were right — they found a real, living Person in the tabernacle!

HAVE YOU HEARD OF THE EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL?

WHAT IS THAT?

"The Bishops of the United States are calling for a three-year grassroots revival of devotion and belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. They believe that God wants to see a movement of Catholics across the United States, healed, converted, formed, and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist—and sent out in mission "for the life of the world." These three years will culminate in the first National Eucharistic Congress in the United States in almost fifty years. Almost a hundred thousand Catholics will join together in Indianapolis for a once-in-a-lifetime pilgrimage toward the "source and summit" of our Catholic faith."

Listening to Jesus- thoughts of Saint Peter Julian Eymard One day, young Peter Julian Eymard [pronounced A-mard], just five years of age, wandered off from the family home. His sister and half-sister searched frantically for the boy and finally located

him in the parish church, standing on a stool close to the tabernacle of the high altar. In response to their anxious questioning, he answered simply, "I am here listening to Jesus."

His life was a true journey to Christ in the Eucharist, a journey begun intuitively on that day when a small boy wandered away from his family home to go to church — to listen to Jesus in the tabernacle.

Eymard's understanding of the Eucharist was not limited merely to adoration but to reaching out to those who were estranged from the Church and evangelizing them. On May 13, 1856 he was given permission that this date is observed in the congregations Father Eymard founded as the feast of Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament.

A LITTLE BOOK

I purchased a little book called My Eucharistic Day, by Saint Peter Julian Eymard in the gift shop in Mundelein Seminary in Libertyville, Illinois where there has been perpetual Adoration since 1926. In nearby Chicago of that same year was the first international Eucharistic Congress held in the United States. Over one million faithful attended the closing Mass and ceremonies. Look it up sometime, it's amazing! I did not come to really appreciate the writings and lessons from Saint Eymard until recently and am finding it


so helpful in deepening my love of Jesus presence in the Holy Eucharist.

Jesus said to [Thomas], "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29).

Every time we attend Mass, something wonderful occurs. In the words of the Credo of the People of God:

Christ cannot be thus present in this sacrament except by the change into his Body of the reality itself of the bread and the change into his Blood of the reality itself of the wine, leaving unchanged only the properties of the bread and wine which our senses perceive. This mysterious change is very appropriately called by the Church *transubstantiation*.

In other words, the Church teaches that the "substance" of the bread and wine are changed at consecration, but the "accidents" remain the same. Before and after consecration, the Body and Blood smell, look, taste and feel like the bread and wine they were before.

Ordinarily.

Sometimes, very rarely, during a Mass, the accidents of the bread and wine apparently change in some way along with the substance. These are known as Eucharistic miracles.

Blessed Carlo Acutis created a website listing <u>Eucharistic Miracles around the world</u>. While his list includes 32 Eucharistic Miracles for Italy, this one is the most well-known and visited.

The Eucharistic Miracle in Lanciano, Italy

The Eucharistic Miracle of Lanciano, located in the region of Abruzzo, is par excellence the most well-known in the Catholic Church.

The miracle took place in the eighth century in a church administered by Basilian monks. Similar to Bolsena, one of the priests was doubting the Real Presence. As he pronounced the consecration, the host was transformed into flesh, the wine into blood.

The Body took on the form of a heart (above), and the Blood coagulated into five irregularly-shaped globules. (on the right)

In 1970, the miracle was subjected to scientific scrutiny. The doctors concluded that the flesh was human heart tissue and the blood is human. Both are from the same blood group, AB.

Today, the relics are conserved in a Franciscan church. While it is often difficult to discern details of other Eucharistic miracles, Lanciano is unique. Close access is possible thanks to a stairway immediately behind the relics. The flesh is preserved within a silver monstrance, the blood globules in a crystal chalice.


Saints Corner - What Saints Say About The Real Presence In the Eucharist


